

## **Empowering a Multi-Teacher Intervention Program for Struggling Readers**





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hen Lynn Mallory, instructional coach and intervention team leader, started using ReadTheory in her middle school intervention program, the students were significantly below grade level in reading. Many were still mastering phonics skills, making it difficult to find independent practice tools that matched their needs while also fostering confidence.

Lynn needed a platform that could adjust to each student's ability, provide meaningful feedback, and show tangible evidence of growth over time. ## **The Solution**

The result? A classroom where students weren't just participating—they were actively engaged in setting goals, measuring growth, and celebrating success.

## **The Impact**

Lynn's leadership sparked momentum across her school, inspiring additional teachers to join her in using ReadTheory and creating a unified, school-wide approach to closing literacy gaps.

Students at Githens Middle School developed a stronger sense of responsibility and ownership over their learning. By seeing firsthand how their daily effort connected to real reading growth, students became more consistently engaged, motivated, and confident in their progress.

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As the intervention team leader, I act as the central piece, checking in with teachers about ReadTheory. I review the weekly reports and often say to teachers, 'Wow, did you see how much so-and-so has grown?' It's turned into a little friendly competition!

One standout success story involved an IEP student who began the year resistant to reading but, after months of hard work on ReadTheory, won the school's overall reading competition—beating general education students. Her confidence soared, and her state test scores showed remarkable growth.

Another success came when the team introduced weekly check-ins with visual graphs, helping students understand that every correct answer moved them closer to leveling up. Students who had once disengaged from reading now eagerly monitored their progress and cheered each other on. Teacher Andrea Hall adds, "I love that ReadTheory meets them where they are, and it's achievable for them.
